Miss Finlayson's Example

Excerpt from "Enchanted" by Taylor Swift

Your eyes whispered, "Have we met?"

'Cross the room your silhouette

Starts to make its way to me

The playful conversation starts

Counter all your quick remarks

Like passing notes in secrecy

Personification: "Your eyes whispered, "Have we met?"

In this line, she is describing how someone's eyes can tell a story. Since Taylor gave a human characteristic to a non-human object (an eye), this is an example of personification.

Simile: "Counter all your quick remarks, Like passing notes in secrecy"

In this line, she is comparing having a quick, back-in-forth conversation to passing secret notes. This means other people might not understand or pick up on their banter because it is a "secret" between two people. Since she is making a comparison using like, this is an example of a simile.

Meaning of the song: "Enchanted" by Taylor Swift is about meeting someone and having an instant, 'magical' connection (like 'love at first sight') with them. In the song, Taylor wonders if the person she met shares the same feelings as her. It's a hopeful and optimistic song, as Taylor frequently alludes to fairy tale tropes ("this is the very first page") to describe her romantic connection.
