Home Practice Program for:

Goal: To improve the ability to say the S sound.

What to Expect:

- Improvement in speech takes time and practice!
- Your child should be able to say the S sound first, then say
 words with the S sound in them, and then move to saying the
 S sound in sentences.
- After a lot of practice, you should begin to hear the **S** sound in your child's everyday speaking.

When and How to Practice:

- The more often you practice the better!
- Practices should only last for 10 to 20 minutes.
- Colour the Picture Cards and pictures on the Game Boards as you say the words together; cut
 out the cards and play a game like 'Find two cards that are the same'; use the Speech Games
 Calendar activities for more practice ideas.
- Work practices into your daily activities, like finding **S** words while reading or walking to school.
- Remember to **Praise** often and be specific, e.g., "That was a great **S** sound!" or "You really tried hard on that one."

How to Get Started and Tips for Making the S Sound:

Step 1:

- Tell your child that you will be practicing making the S sound which is like a snake's "SSSSSSSS".
- To make this sound, have your child make a smile, and close the front teeth together to ensure the tongue does not come out. Then begin to say the **S** sound in a continuous stream of sound.
- Demonstrate making this sound and having your child imitate. A mirror can be used to help judge that the tongue is not coming out between the teeth.

Step 2:

- Have your child say some of the words on the picture cards.
- Move to playing games or using the Speech Games Calendar activities to practice saying the words with the S sound at the beginning of the word.
- Once this has been achieved, move to saying the words with the **S** sound at the end of word, and then words with the **S** sound in the middle of the word.

Step 3:

- Now that your child can easily make the **S** sound in words, practice using the words in sentences.
- You can use the same activities you used in Step 2 and 3, but have your child make sentences like
 "I have two socks" or "I really like to sing."

• After lots of practice with Steps 2-4, your child will finally be ready to use the S sound in daily talking. Step 4: Step 3: Use the sound in Daily Talking Use the sound in Words

If your child has trouble saying a word, try these cues:

- Say the instructions for making the **S** sound, as in "smile and keep your teeth together and sound like a snake hissing "**SSSSSSSS**".
- Put extra stress on your sound. For example, say "SSS un" and really prolong the S sound.
- Be specific when correcting your child, e.g. "Good try, but you forgot your "S" sound in that word. I heard the *TH-sound*. Let's try again".
- Take a break when your child needs it.

- Google Hamilton Public Library Tumblebooks for animated books, stories and activities. Your child can look at these books on their own and with you. Your child may also talk about the pictures in the story for more speech sound practice. Look for these book titles: "Suki's Kimono", "You See a Circus"
- Computer apps, websites, and online videos can make learning fun and engaging but do not replace the guidance of parents and professionals. Your encouragement and support will be the best way to help your child improve.



Have fun and remember change takes time and practice!






Picture cards for the S sound — at the end of words




Picture cards for the S sound — at the end of words

Don't Miss the Bus


