### Learn to use

⇒ Past Progressive Verbs

Verbs "was/were"; ending "ing"

- First, you will want to make sure your child learns to use the verbs
   "was/were" with the verb ending "ing" to indicate that something is was
   happening in the past.
- Pictures and activities are provided to help you teach your child to use past progressive verbs with the verb ending "ing" in sentences.
- If possible practice a few minutes every day until you hear your child using past progressive verbs with the verb ending "ing" in sentences.



### Practice Anywhere Anytime!

They were planting the garden!

- You can use past progressive verbs with the verb ending "ing" everyday when talking to your child.
- You can encourage your child to use the correct past progressive verbs all day long!
- Remember to use your voice to stress the use of "ing" on the end of past progressive verbs when talking together.
  - When your child is able to use "was/were" and the ending "ing" for past progressive verbs in practice times, begin to ask him/her "What was he/she doing?" during your activities.

Practice using past progressive verbs "was/were" with the "ing" ending



### Step 1:

- Talk directly about the verbs "was/were" and the marker "ing" on the end of verbs. Tell your child that "we use "was/were" and "ing" on the end of an action word when we talk about "what happened".
- Using one of the pictures provided, give clear examples of sentences using the verbs "was/were" and the marker "ing" as in "He was kicking the ball", "They were dancing to the music".

### Step 2:

- Look at some of the attached action pictures together. Practice saying some sentences together, e.g. "She was cooking the eggs" or "They were playing basketball".
- Once your child is saying the sentences correctly, play a game where your child answers questions
  like, "What was he/she doing." Expect an action sentence in reply e.g. "He was throwing the ball".

### Step 3:

 Now that your child can use the verbs "was/were" and the marker "ing" on the end of verbs in structured activities, use the suggested games and activities to encourage your child to use past progressive verbs more independently.

### Step 4:

- It can take some time and practice before your child begins to use past progressive verbs independently in his/her every day speaking.
- Take advantage of opportunities in your daily activities, like reading together or going for walks to prompt for the correct verb by asking a question as in "What was he/she doing?" or "What were they doing?". Remember to expect an action sentence in reply.

### Step 5:

• You will begin to hear the correct use of the verbs "was/were" and the marker "ing" on the end of verbs in your child's everyday speaking.



### If your child has trouble saying a word, try these cues:

- Put extra stress in your voice when using the "ing" on the end of the action word. If necessary, review the instructions, emphasizing the correct verb, as in "Remember to use 'He was jumping'!"
- Give your child a choice "Should you say 'He jump' or 'He was jumping'?"
- Be specific when correcting your child, e.g. "Good try, but you forgot to say
  'was jumping'. I heard 'He jump'. Let's try again and remember to say 'He was
  jumping'".



### Activities for using the Practice Cards


- Colour the past tense cards. Cut the past progressive verb cards out. Paste the cards onto cardboard while making up past progressive action sentences.
- Play 'Memory' using pairs of your cards. Make past progressive action sentences as you turn cards over to find matches.
- Make a road using the action cards. Make past progressive sentences as you drive over the cards with a toy car.
- **Use a flashlight** to find the cards that were hidden in a room. Make past progressive sentences as the cards are highlighted.
- Play Lotto with your child. Use one set of cards to make 2 grids of 8 pictures each. Use the second set of cards as 'calling cards'. Take turns picking a card, making a past progressive sentence and finding its match on the grid. The first one to fill a grid wins.
- Play 'Go Fish". Attach paper clips to the cards and then use a magnetic fishing pole to catch the card and make a past progressive sentence.
- Use the 'What Was Happening' Board Game with the instructions provided.


Activities for Every Day




- Choose a favourite toy (action figure or doll) and make past progressive sentences together as the toy is used to do different actions.
- While at the park or on a walk, listen for your child to use the "ing" on the end of past progressive verbs. If a mistake is made, give your child a choice, (i.e. "She jump over the rope" or "She was jumping over the rope"?).
- While **colouring** make up past progressive action sentences for the characters as you colour.
- While eating a meal, play a game of Right or Wrong? Say an action sentence using either the correct past progressive verb, or incorrect, as in "He wash his hands" or "He was washing his hands?". Your child must tell you if you said it right or wrong, and then correct your error if you said it wrong.
- While reading together, look at pictures in the story book and make past progressive action sentences using the pictures.
- Use all talking times as a 'practice session' by stressing the use of the verbs "was/were" and the "ing" marker in your own speech!










