Learn to use

 \Rightarrow Plural Word Ending - Use **s** or **z** sounds, as in cat**s** and dog**z**

I am walking my dogs.



- First, make sure your child learns to use wording endings when we are talking about more than one object by clearly telling him/her how to use these, as in "When we have more than one dog we say 'dogz'."
- Use the pictures and activities provided to help you teach your child to use these word endings.
- If possible, practice a few minutes every day until you hear your child using the word endings. Practices should last no longer than 10 to 20 minutes.

- Stress the plural word endings everyday when talking to your child.
- Encourage your child to use correct plural words endings all day long!

- Remember to use your voice to stress the use of these plural word endings when talking to you child.
- When your child is able to use these word endings in practice times, ask him/her "What do you see?" during all your activities to practice using the plural ending.

Step 1:

- Talk directly about putting the plural word ending on words. Tell your child that "When we talk about
 more than one thing we put a sound on the end of our word, like "I had one cat, and now I have two
 cats".
- Using the pictures provided, giving clear examples using the word ending, as in "Here is one block, but I see more blocks."

Step 2:

- Look at the attached pictures together. Practice saying some sentences together, i.e. "I see three blocks" or "The bats are flying."
- Once your child is saying the sentences correctly, play a game where your child answers the question
 "What do you see?". Expect a sentence that has the key word with the correct plural ending in reply, e.g.
 "I see the boots!".

Step 3:

Now that your child can use the plural endings 's' and 'z' in this structured activity, use the suggested
games and activities to encourage your child to use the correct plural endings 's' and 'z' more independently.

Step 4:

- It can take some time and practice before your child begins to use these plural endings 's' and 'z' independently in his/her every day speaking.
- Take advantage of opportunities in your daily activities, like reading together or going for walks to prompt for the correct plural ending by asking a question as in "What do you see?".

Step 5:

You will begin to hear the correct use of plural endings 's' and 'z' in your child's everyday speaking.



If your child has trouble saying a word, try these cues:

- Put extra stress in your voice when using the plural endings 's' and 'z'. If necessary, review the instructions, emphasizing the correct plural ending, as in "Remember to use "cats".
- Give your child a choice "Should you say 'I see two cat or I see two cats'?"
- Be specific when correcting your child, e.g. "Good try, but you forgot to say the 's' on the end. I heard 'cat'. Let's try again and remember to say 'cats'".

Activities for using the Practice Cards


- Colour the plural endings 's' and 'z' cards. Cut the cards out. Paste the plural endings 's' and 'z' cards on cardboard while making up sentences.
- Play 'Memory' using pairs of your plural endings 's' and 'z' cards. Make sentences as you turn cards over to make matches e.g. "I found the cupcakes!".
- ◆ Match the pictures and count the pictures for a total across both cards (i.e." There are 4 snakes!"
- Make a road using the plural endings 's' and 'z' cards. Make up sentences as you drive over the cards with a toy car.
- Use a flashlight to find the plural endings 's' and 'z' cards that were hidden in a room. Make up sentences as the cards are highlighted.
- Play Lotto with your child. Use one set of plural endings 's' and 'z' cards to make 2 grids of 8 pictures each. Use the second set of cards as 'calling cards'. Take turns picking a card, making a sentence and finding its match on the grid. The first one to fill a grid wins.
- Play 'Go Fish". Attach paper clips to the plural endings 's' and 'z' cards and then use a magnetic fishing pole to catch the card and make a sentence.
- Use the 'What Are They?" Board Game with the instructions provided.



- Activities for Every Day
- While **walking** look for things that are in groups of 2 or more, and make up sentences about those things you see.
- ♦ While at the park or on a walk, listen for your child to use plural endings 's' and 'z'. If a mistake is made, give your child a choice, (i.e. swing or swings?).
- While **colouring** make up sentences using the plural endings 's' and 'z' for the pictures as you colour.
- ♦ While **eating a meal**, play a game of "Right or Wrong?". Say an sentence using either the correct plural endings 's' and 'z', or incorrect, as in "I am eating my carrot'. Your child must tell you if you said it right or wrong, and then correct your error if you said it wrong.
- While reading together, look at pictures in the story book and make sentences using plural endings 's' and 'z' to describe the pictures.
- Use all talking times as a 'practice session' by stressing the use of the plural endings 's' and 'z' in your own speech!




Picture Cards for the Plural Word Ending S...




Picture Cards for the Plural Word Ending S...
