WH Question Words

What, When, Where, Who

What are they playing with?



- First, you will want to make sure your child learns to use **WH question words** to ask questions about a thing/event (What), the time something happened (When), a place (Where), and about a person/people (Who).
- Pictures and activities are provided to help you teach your child to use **WH** question words to ask questions.
- If possible practice a few minutes every day until you hear your child using WH question words when asking questions.

You can use WH question words everyday when talking to your child.

You can encourage your child to use the correct **third person** present tense verbs all day long!

Remember to use your voice to stress the use of WH question words when talking to your child.

When your child is able to use **WH question words** in practice times, be sure to answer all those questions, and praise your child!

Step 1:

- ◆ Talk directly about asking questions using WH question words. Tell your child that "we use WH question words to ask questions about a thing/event (What), the time something happened (When), a place (Where), and about a person/people (Who).
- Using one of the pictures provided, give clear examples of sentences using **WH question words** to ask a question about the picture e.g. "Who baked the bread?", "What is he reading?"

Step 2:

- Look at some of the attached pictures together. Practice asking WH questions using WH question words together, e.g. "When can you make a snowman?" or "Where do apples grow".
- Once your child is asking the questions correctly, play a game where your child asks questions like, "Who drives a fire truck?" and you provide the answer.

Step 3:

 Now that your child can use WH question words to ask questions in structured activities, use the suggested games and activities to encourage your child to use WH question words more independently.

Step 4:

- It can take some time and practice before your child begins to use **WH question words** independently in his/her every day speaking.
- Take advantage of opportunities in your daily activities, like reading together or going for walks to prompt for the correct **WH question word** by asking a question as in "**What** do you see?" and encourage your child to then ask you a question of his/her own. Remember to expect your child to use a **WH question word** when asking his/her question!

Step 5:

You will begin to hear the correct use of WH question words in your child's everyday speaking.

Provide help

If your child has trouble using WH question words, try these cues:

- Put extra stress in your voice when using the question words "What, Where, When, and Who". If necessary, review the instructions, emphasizing the correct WH question word, as in "Where is my shoe!"
- Be specific when correcting your child, e.g. "Good try, but you forgot to say 'Where is my shoe?'. I heard 'Shoe?'. Let's try again and remember to say 'Where is my shoe?'.".

Activities for using the Practice Cards


- Colour the WH question cards. Cut the cards out. Paste the cards onto cardboard while making up WH word questions for each card.
- Play 'Memory' using pairs of your cards. Ask questions about the cards using WH question words as you turn cards over to find matches.
- Make a road using the cards. Ask questions about the cards using WH question words as you drive over the cards with a toy car.
- Use a flashlight to find the cards that were hidden in a room. Ask questions about the cards using WH question words as the cards are highlighted.
- Play Lotto with your child. Use one set of cards to make 2 grids of 8 pictures each. Use the second set of cards as 'calling cards'. Take turns picking a card, asking questions about the cards using WH question words and finding its match on the grid. The first one to fill a grid wins.
- Play 'Go Fish". Attach paper clips to the verb cards and then use a magnetic fishing pole to catch the card and ask questions about the cards using WH question words.
- Use the 'Ask Your Question!' Board Game with the instructions provided.

Activities for Every Day


- While walking look for people doing things and ask questions about the people using the question word "Who".
- Choose a favourite toy (action figure or doll) and make third person present tense action sentences together as the toy is used to do different actions.
- ♦ While at the park or on a walk, listen for your child to use "s" and "es" on the end of third person present tense verbs. If a mistake is made, give your child a choice, (i.e. "She jump over the rope" or "She jumps over the rope"?).
- While colouring make up questions about the pictures using WH question words.
- While eating a meal, play a game of Right or Wrong? Ask a question using either the correct or incorrect WH question word, as in "When wants some carrots?" or "Who is on the plate?". Your child must tell you if you said it right or wrong, and then correct your error if you said it wrong.
- While reading together, look at pictures in the story book and encourage your child to use WH question words to ask about the pictures.
- Use all talking times as a 'practice session' by stressing the use of WH question words in your own speech!




Picture Cards for the Question Word "Who"




Picture Cards for the Question Word "Who"




Picture Cards for The Question Word "What"




Picture Cards for The Question Word "What"




Picture Cards for The Question Word "Where"




Picture Cards for The Question Word "Where"










| Make a road using your cards. Ask WH questions as you drive over the cards with a toy car. | Play a matching game with pairs of cards. Mix them up and put them face down on a table. Take turns choosing and naming 2 cards and ask a WH question about each card. | Play 'Go Fish' or 'Memory' using pairs of your cards. Ask a WH question using your WH question words for each picture. | Put picture cards in a bag. Have your child close his/her eyes, pick a card, and ask a WH question about the picture. | WEDNESDAY |
| While colouring use your WH question words to ask WH questions as you colour the pictures. | Draw action pictures on blank paper and take turns with your child asking WH questions about the pictures you draw. | At the grocery store, watch for people doing things. Have your child ask WH questions about what the people are doing. | Cut out pictures in a magazine of people doing activities. Ask WH questions as you make a collage. | THURSDAY |
| Ask 2 or more WH questions about your picture cards and get a sticker or stamp. | Tape a few verb pictures to the bathroom mirror . Ask a WH question for each picture before your child brushes his/her teeth. | Place your cards around a room and turn off the lights. Use a flashlight to find the cards and ask a WH question about each card. | Play Tic-tac-toe with a partner using your cards. Place cards in a grid of 9 pictures. Use chips to mark your spot. | FRIDAY |
| Tape cards on toy bowling pins. Line them up and roll a ball. Ask a WH Question for those knocked down. | Choose a favourite toy (action figure or doll) and ask WH questions as the toy is used to do different actions. | Make a puzzle together. Give your child a puzzle piece for each WH question he/she can ask. | Look at pictures in a picture story book. Ask WH questions about these pictures. | SATURDAY |
