
Why do people immigrate today? Create a list of reasons why.





# WANTS DOMESTIC SERVANTS

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Issued by the Authority of the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, Canada. 1908 "When I speak of quality I have in mind ... I think a stalwart [loyal] peasant in a sheep-skin coat, born on the soil, whose forefathers have been farmers for ten generations, with a stout [strong] wife and a half-dozen children, is good quality. A Trades Union artisan who will not work more than eight hours a day and will not work that long if he can help it, will not work on a farm at all and has to be fed by the public when his work is slack is, in my judgement, quantity and very bad quantity. I am indifferent as to whether or not he is British-born. It matters not what his nationality is."



## Immigration Act of 1906: What do some of these terms show about who Canada values as an immigrant?



"No immigrant shall be permitted to land in Canada, who is:

- ... an idiot, or an epileptic, or who is insane, or has had an attack of insanity within five years; nor shall any immigrant be so landed who is deaf or dumb [unable to speak], or dumb, blind or infirm; ...
  - afflicted with a loathsome disease or with a disease which is contagious or infectious and which may become dangerous to the public health; ...
  - a pauper, or destitute, or professional beggar, or vagrant, or who is likely to become a public charge"

- Immigration Act, 1906



"38. The Governor in Council may, by proclamation or order whenever he deems it necessary or expedient, ...

(a) prohibit the landing in Canada ... of any immigrant who has come to Canada otherwise than by continuous journey from the country of which he is a native or naturalized citizen, and upon a through ticket purchased in that country, or prepaid in Canada; ...

(c) prohibit for a stated period, or permanently, the landing in Canada ... of immigrants belonging to any race deemed unsuited to the climate or requirements of Canada, or of immigrants of any specified class, occupation or character."

Bloc Settlements: Small colonies that are formed of groups of settlers from the same country of origin.

What are the different perspectives on bloc settlements shown here:

"The Galicians [Ukrainians] and Doukhobors ... are allowed to live in communities. If they do that, they are bound to perpetuate their religion and their habits - and I must say that some of those habits are very filthy - and will not, in any reasonable length of time, assimilate with the rest of the population. If these people must be brought in, for heaven's sake, let us have them distributed here and there so that they may learn in a short time a different way of living."

"If we are ever going to have the North-West populated, we shall not succeed in doing it by standing on our boundary with a club or putting the microscope on every man who wishes to come into the country....
[The Ukrainians] are people who have lived in poverty. That is no crime on their part.... [They are] of good physique, and they are people of good intellectual capacity; and they are moral and well-living people."
